



## BUTTERFLY MASK-MAKING INSTRUCTION SHEET

The Avon Gorge and Downs are one of the most exciting places to enjoy wildlife in Bristol, and they're only two miles from the city centre!  
Why don't you have a go at making a **Butterfly** mask?



### Facts:

Did you know that the painted lady butterfly flies all the way from North Africa to the Downs in the spring? They then fly all the way back again in the autumn to lay their eggs when it gets too cold in England.

### Instructions:

- 1) Decorate the mask on page 2. You can either do this by colouring it in, or for a more exciting effect why not try sticking bits of shiny, sparkly or furry material on it? The more colours and textures the better!
- 2) Cut around the mask. You may need an adult to help you with this as it is quite tricky!
- 3) Cut out the eyes in the centre of the mask. You'll definitely need an adult to help you with this bit!
- 4) Staple or stick a piece of elastic to each side of the mask. If you use staples, you will need to cover it with a bit of sticky tape to stop it from scratching your skin when you put it on.
